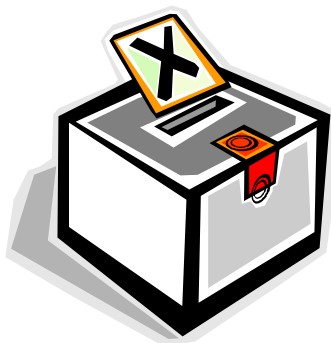

## Election Forum

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## Life, Death and the Communion of Saints

Recent events have prompted these thoughts. During the last few weeks, we have been commemorating the earthly lives of various members of our St Michael's family, some well-known to us all, others less so, but all linked together by the baptism that marked each one. Baptism, as Paul reminds us in Romans chapter 6, unites us with Christ by our symbolic sharing in His death and resurrection. We commended them all to the love and mercy of our heavenly Father. I find a link here with Diana's sermon at a recent Tuesday Eucharist, when she spoke of Timothy and Titus, companions to Paul. She reminded us the word 'companion' is derived from two Latin words, and it means 'sharing bread together.'

Week by week the baptised meet at St Michael's to break bread together, and to find the strength and inspiration to live out their companionship with Christ, with each other, day by day, year by year. This life centred on God is called in the New Testament 'eternal life' or 'the Kingdom of God' (the terms are interchangeable). It begins now and continues through death into that other dimension in the nearer presence of God. This is a deep mystery lying at the heart of our faith and it is proclaimed in both word and sacrament.

At funerals we sometimes hear 'In my Father's house are many dwelling-places' and 'I am convinced that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord'. So let us remember with joy and thanksgiving those companions we see no longer, but whose presence hovers about us, like 'that great cloud of witnesses' spoken of in the Letter to the Hebrews. In the early church all Christians were 'saints' so we can with confidence pray for the Communion of Saints, some of whom are listed in our greatly valued Book of Remembrance.

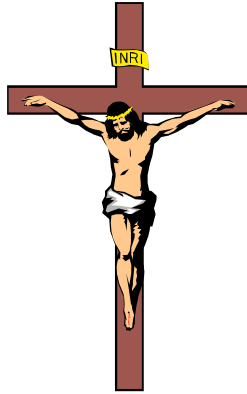

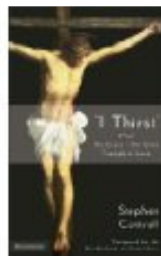
**What you may not  
know about the  
Hospice of St Francis**  
*(From the Hospice  
newsletter)*

The Hospice of St Francis is not just the 12 beds in its unit. The staff also care for some 300 people in their own homes, in local hospitals or in care homes. And care is given not just to people with cancer; about a quarter of its patients have other illnesses. Hospice staff don't just care for patients, they care also for the family and friends of the patient. Serious illness brings uncertainty and despair to the whole family and the hospice supportive care team help those close to a patient to adjust to change and voice their worries. And, although the hospice is based in Berkhamsted its patients come from a much wider area, as far as St Albans in one direction and Amersham, Chesham and the Chalfonts in another.

**Our choice for Lent is**  
*I Thirst* by Stephen Cottrell



This reflective, prayerful, thought-provoking book follows the Passion story in John's Gospel, penetrating the deep mystery of a God who loves humanity no matter what the cost. In his foreword, Rowan Williams writes: "A movingly personal book, and a practical one ... so readable, so compelling and so helpful; the fruit of much deeply meditated sharing of the Good News with people of all sorts. Reading it is a real rediscovery of the fresh waters of faith."

## Our Persecuted Family in COLOMBIA



Colombia, in South America, is a country at war with itself, where paramilitary and guerrilla groups fight amongst themselves and against the government armed forces, financed by the drug trade and extortion. Churches stand in the middle of the conflict, often as mediators, and for this they are targeted. Many pastors and church leaders have been summarily murdered or 'disappeared' without any given reason. Kidnapping of children and forcing them to be soldiers is also a big problem. Rehabilitating rescued children after they have been brutalized and forced to kill without a

second thought is hugely difficult.

Colombia is also home to a number of indigenous groups who still follow their ancient way of life. One such is the Kogui tribe. Many of them became Christians about 20 years ago but are paying a heavy price (imprisonment, murder) for just wanting to follow Christ in their normal Kogui way of life.

**Pray that the Kogui Christians will be allowed to live as believers in their own community. Pray for government efforts to end the ongoing warring of factions, and that Christian pastors would remain firm in faith as they lead the church in walking the path of peace.**

Over recent years, and particularly since her accident, we had become very close, and our shared interest in the Drama Groups at St Michael's cemented a firm friendship. She was highly intelligent, stimulating, with a deep Christian conviction, and a great sense of humour - we shared our regular Friday afternoon tea parties with great enjoyment. In extreme pain at times, her immense courage led her to continually work to improve her voice production, and her mobility, and she taught herself to write and draw impeccably using her left hand. It was a year almost to the day since she lost her beloved John upon whom she had depended greatly. We first lost Liz on March 5 2005 but, after having been on life support, she miraculously recovered. Thankfully she was given another five years with us, but we lost her finally on January 28 2010. She will be so greatly missed but heaven will be the richer for this amazing and sparkling Star.
