Get Knitting!

Crafty Cuppa invite you to knit poppies for Remembrance Sunday. Join them on 12 or 26 September or 10 or 24 October at St. Michael's between 10.30a.m. and 12 noon to knit in company, or get knitting at home and bring your poppies into the church, or give them to someone who can bring them on your behalf.

Poppy knitting pattern.

Cast on 80 sts

4mm(UK8) needles

Red DK Wool.

Row 1-8

Knit every row.

Row 9 -K2 together, repeat to end (40sts)

Row 10 - K2 repeat to end (20sts)

Row 11 - K2 together to end (10sts)

Cut yarn with a long end and thread a sewing needle.

Run yarn through remaining 10 stitches. Remove them off needle, pull up tight, sew up side seam and fasten off. Sew a black button, or circle of black felt or crochet centre with black wool.

2025 Harvest Appeal Charity: Karibuni Children in Kenya

Karibuni Children are a charity run from Stoke Mandeville that works to help Kenyan children to fulfil their potential and release themselves from the cycle of poverty. They do this by partnering with locally run projects to support children who may not otherwise receive an education, to go to school. Over 1,000 children and young people have completed their education through their programme, 700 children and young people are currently being supported through their education by them. 27% of Karibuni children achieved higher grades than the national average at secondary school and 20% of Karibuni children achieved higher grades than the national average at primary school. The charity's mission is "Transforming young Kenyan lives through education, empowering each child to fulfil their potential and release themselves from the cycle of poverty" and their vision "To create a sustainable environment where every supported child, their family unit and local community has the opportunity to be self-sufficient."

Their former Chairman of Trustees, Nigel

Roberts, is an Amersham resident and well known to many of us here in St Michaels; he, or another Trustee/ Supporter of the Charity, will be coming to the 10am service at St Michael's on Sunday 7th September to give a presentation about the work they do and, of course, to encourage us to give generously to them."


A locally run Kenyan charity, which helps children escape poverty and gain an education.

A Pilgrim Rose by Rebecca Olsen

In a moment of spiritual difficulty I was gifted this very special rose. 'It's a Pilgrim Rose', I was told.

As I walked home, holding the rose, I looked at the petals, how they curved in ways that allowed them to fit in, how they clustered at the centre of the rose then spread out around the outer reaches of the rose. I watched how the light filtered through each part of the rose, some places hardly touching the petals whilst other petals became almost transparent.

I considered my life against my observations of the rose, the twists and turns it has taken, how light has not always penetrated when too many things have been happening or too many or the wrong people were too close, but also how all parts create the whole.

Roses do not grow without water or sunlight and likewise we do not grow without water and we can face lots of difficulty without sunlight. As Christians we believe God to be the light of the world

John 8:12:*Jesus says*, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

and that the living water of the Lord sustains us.

John 4:14, Jesus says, "whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

In the rose I remember that reflections of God are all around us, ready to pull us back onto our pilgrimage towards Him; ready to remind us that light exists even when we might be walking in darkness, and that those walking in light are surrounding us, ready to remind us of Jesus and guide us out of darkness.

The Cross Day By Edmond Eiliazadeh

The Christian calendar includes various feasts of the Cross, all of which commemorate the cross used in the crucifixion of Jesus Christ.

Each year on 14 September the church celebrates Holy Cross Day in most of the Anglican community. This is known as an important symbol for the church. Afterall we regularly make "The sign of the cross", and a majority of us bow to the cross during the liturgy.

Perhaps, also it is interesting to mention that in the Assyrian community, there is a similar marked day known as a "cleansing of the cross", which occurs after Easter on a particular Sunday including the Eucharist. During the ceremony, the priest takes the cross off the stand and walks to the churchyard and asks the congregation to follow and help in cleaning the cross with the blessed water. This is supposedly to clean the blood of Christ off the cross after the crucifixion.

While the cleaning of the cross is in progress, the priest asks for some donations/gifts from the congregation. This process is performed like an auction. The name of whoever gives the highest donation is announced as a cross carrier, then he or she walks back into the church with the cross and the next highest bidder puts the cross in the stand.

The donations are used for good causes.



For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. (1 Corinthians 1:18).


